Protection of public assets based on Council's current understanding of 'road' status – assists Council's enforcement processes to provide public access and protect adjacent private assets, noting divided public opinion over access and public use of assets	
Retaining obstructed laneways and passageways until contested ownership is resolved seen as measure to deter future obstruction of land	
No changes to resourcing or processes to management road infrastructure

Council's level of liability is likely to be reduced if there is an injury, loss or damage on an obstructed laneway or passageway	Removal of 'public road' status may encourage obstruction of 'roads' and may limit Council's ability to protect public assets and enforce public access and protection of private assets, noting divided public opinion over access and public use of assets
