Upgrade to the composting facilities at FareShare's Abbotsford Kitchen Garden

Project Description: Funding from City of Yarra will enable FareShare to upgrade our composting facilities. At the Abbotsford Garden we compost plant material and vegetable scraps from our kitchen and apply this to the productive beds to continuously improve soil health and provide a slow-release form of nutrients for the crops. Six 1.4m x 1.4m compost bays were constructed in 2016. Over time the front boards, that are added/removed to match the height of composting material, have deteriorated and are no longer serviceable.

For this project, we propose replacing the front boards and taking the opportunity to make them easier to use, by installing guide rails to hold the boards in place, adding spacers to improve airflow and adding covers to control moisture levels. Increasing airflow is especially important as the compost bays sit on a base of concrete, rather than in contact with the earth.

We would also like to build a seventh bay to provide a set of 3 drying racks made from Reo mesh to allow us to dry woody/thicker plant material before putting this through our shredder/mulcher for composting. The Shredder/mulcher was purchased with a 2021/2022 Small Project Grant, and this has been fantastic in enabling us to retain much more material onsite for composting. Drying plant material first helps to ensure the Shredder does not become clogged.

FareShare staff and volunteers have the tools and skills to install this project and once the wood has been purchased, will be able to complete the works within two months.

The funding will be used for outreach into the North Richmond community and to inspire people (particularly young people) to become involved in their environment and share their skills and stories in (and

the lead up to) this event. This opportunity will create on-going engagement in a range of social activities into the future.

Leading this workshop will be Abdi Aden, a refugee from Somalia. Abdi's work revolves around community development. Overcoming hardship, mental health issues, adolescence and difficult social positions are themes that tend to recur in youth work.

The process will involve an inspirational workshop session engaging mainly young people that will set up volunteer and paid work at the event. It will also be the catalyst for an ongoing series of these workshops and further involvement in work and social activities by the participants.

This process will create extra reach into communities not readily accessible in order to foster engagement and present their stories.

This outreach to the community will find performers, crew, microbusiness entrepreneurs, storytellers and stallholders. We will also endeavour to find locally grown ingredients (eg community gardens) and find alternative waste reduction methods and processes.

Project Description: Alice Springs-based artist Chris Ng is presenting a major solo exhibition at West Space titled 'Where You From?', a question often asked in Mparntwe. It is a colloquial phrase but given the context – spoken on land where local Indigenous cultures and languages are still commonly practiced – it can also hold deep ancestral meaning. Realised across ceramics, Batik textile and installation, 'Where you from?' looks to reimagine cultural identities and histories, to redefine an understanding of multiculturalism in so-called 'Australia'. In Melbourne, Chris asks what the same question means in a metropolitan centre, on unceded sovereign lands, to discuss settler and First Nations solidarities.

Chris will travel to Melbourne for the exhibition opening, and to present a free Batik workshop for people of all skill levels at West Space, in the Courtyard of Collingwood Yards on Sunday the 29th of October. This will be an opportunity for Chris to share her culture, and for the themes and stories in the exhibition to be unpacked in an accessible way through conversation.

Chris has staged these workshops before in arts contexts in Alice Springs and in remote communities in the NT. With her guidance, participants will go through the process of making Batik textiles, and will be able to take a piece of fabric home with them.
