

As we move into the heart of winter,



We recently adopted our Budget for 2023/24, which puts the community first without impacting service delivery. It also brings into effect the separation of waste service charges from general rates. Head to pages 4–5 for more.

Yarra has recently been honoured at a number of awards ceremonies. Our Yarra Grooves project was recognised at the 2023 Mainstreet Australia Awards; and our Open Library initiative, providing extended library access beyond regular staffed hours, won the "Service Delivery Initiative" category at the LGPro Awards for Excellence. As part of a review of our Council Order that's outlined within our Domestic Animal Management Plan, we're considering the introduction of a night-time cat curfew to protect our native wildlife and create a safer environment for our pets. Latest News

Open Library project recognised at LGPro Awards for Excellence

Yarra Libraries' dedication to enhancing community resource access has been spotlighted at this year's LGPro Awards for Excellence, clinching the "Service Delivery Initiative" category for our Open Library initiative. The annual event recognises achievements in Victoria's Local Government sector. Launched in 2021, Open Library provides extended library access beyond regular staffed hours, following a simple induction program.

The innovative project, which has benefited over 11,000 community members so far, applies to Bargoonga Nganjin North Fitzroy Library and Richmond Library, with plans to expand to more branches.



E-scooter trial extended to October 2023

The Victorian Government has extended its e-scooter trial and legalised private e-scooters. Yarra is one of four Victorian councils participating in the trial, along with Melbourne, Port Phillip and Ballarat.

Since the trial began in February last year, e-scooters have provided the Yarra community with a new, accessible, ecofriendly, and cost-effective way to travel around Yarra.

However, community concerns about disability access and mobility issues have



been raised. We take these concerns seriously and have communicated them to the government, and are working with e-scooter operators to address the issues to ensure safe and accessible streets for everyone.

We are committed to advocating for disability access, educating users on road rules and parking, and maintaining pedestrian access on footpaths. Details can be found at yarracity.vic.gov.au/escooters

Yarra awarded top prize at Mainstreet Australia Awards

Our Yarra Grooves project has been recognised at the 2023 Mainstreet Australia Awards in the "Best Main Street Place activation, event or initiative" category. This initiative, using silent disco to explore local history, attracted over 500 participants when it ran last year. With the support of performing company Guru Dudu, we designed a COVIDSafe outdoor experience. Tours emphasised local history, including immigration, art and sport; and highlighted the importance of supporting local traders. This award is a clear endorsement of our efforts to boost Yarra's economic recovery which has exceeded initial forecasts.

Yarra's 2023/24 Budget puts the community first

Our Budget for 2023/24 puts community first, paving the way to a financially sustainable future.

By being smarter and more efficient in how we utilise funds, we can provide for both current and future residents.

The Budget is informed by Yarra's Council Plan 2021–25 and Community Vision 2036 – both developed in partnership with our community. In addition, we consult with the community every year when preparing our annual Budget.

We are grateful to everyone in our community who helped shape this year's Budget. We heard from hundreds of people about their priorities and vision for the future during broad community consultation in November and December 2022, and over a hundred more in April and May with their feedback on the draft Budget.

Key projects this year include investing in housing and homelessness support, a better school commute for families, local liveable streets, more parks and open spaces, tackling the climate emergency, and better bicycle and road infrastructure.

Highlights of the 2023/24 Budget:

Delivering and designing new parks, and upgrading existing, including feasibility studies for the Roads to Open Space project.



Improving road safety and amenity with major infrastructure upgrades, improvements to pedestrian and traffic infrastructure, and the development of parking strategies including for e-scooters.

Preparing the New Deal for Schools, a flagship transport program to increase the proportion of children walking, cycling and scooting to school, reduce school traffic and improve the school commute for families.

Enhancing youth engagement and participation, focusing on at-risk young people, promoting the voices of young people and participation in decision-making and employment opportunities.

Making improvements across Yarra's bicycle network with a focus on Strategic Cycling Corridors like Wellington Street's bicycle lanes.

Accelerating Yarra's Tree Planting program as a Natural Cooling Climate Emergency Response by increasing annual planting from 330 to 660 trees.

Supporting community street events and activations that celebrate the diversity and vibrancy of Yarra, like Lunar New Year and the Johnston Street Fiesta.



Boosting grants funding to provide emergency rent relief for those experiencing rental distress; support people at risk of, or experiencing, homelessness; and address the social and cultural impacts for tenants of community housing.



Expanding our community engagement program and improving the community's digital access and customer experience with Yarra.

Your rates at work 2022/23

Rates notices and waste service charges

Rates notices will be sent to property owners in August. Your rates help us deliver a wide range of services, programs and infrastructure that make Yarra a great place to live, work and visit.

This year, we have increased total general rates revenue by 3.5%, in line with the Victorian Government's rate cap to account for the increasing cost of service and infrastructure provision.

Yarra has resolved to separate waste service charges from general rates to account for the increasing costs of waste and recycling services, in line with all other Victorian councils. Yarra's waste service charge will be made up of two elements: a public waste rate and a kerbside waste rate. The kerbside waste rate will only be applied to properties that receive a kerbside waste collection service from Yarra.

A rich resource for community learning

In collaboration with the Victorian Government, we've transformed a former bank on Victoria Street into a vibrant community hub: The Learning Bank.

The Learning Bank is more than just a space – it's a place for residents and businesses to connect, create, and learn. It hosts a range of programs, from digital training courses to business training events, designed to meet the diverse needs of our community.

One standout program is the BeConnected Digital Training Course, providing digital basics – it's one of a series of upcoming courses run in different languages. For local business owners, peer learning sessions offer valuable upskilling opportunities on topics like radical collaboration and cybersecurity.

The Learning Bank also houses the Thread Together clothing hub, an ethical fashion not-for-profit, and the ATM Café by North Richmond Community Health, a social enterprise café celebrating health and cultural diversity.





The initiative embodies Yarra's commitment to fostering a connected, inclusive and vibrant community. By providing a space for learning and growth, we're investing in our community's future.

The Victorian Government contributed a total of \$1,105,794 through the North Richmond Precinct Community Grants Program to establish this pop-up community space, which we will manage for three years. We're also committed to providing \$120,000 of in-kind support over the life of the project.

Council is in the final stages of developing flood maps for the municipality. We want to understand more about our community's experience with flooding and rising water levels.

Furry friends and native fauna: balancing urban life in Yarra

We're reviewing our Council Order, which outlines the requirements for people owning domestic cats and dogs within Yarra.

The review is included in our Domestic Animal Management Plan (DAMP) that Council adopted in 2021. A night-time cat curfew is being proposed as part of the review.

This measure would require cats to stay within their owner's premises between 7pm and 7am.



The curfew is designed to keep our cats safe from injury and disease, lessen the chance of cats going missing, protect native wildlife, reduce cat-related disturbances at night, and reduce their exposure to extreme weather. Many innercity councils already have a cat curfew or are considering introducing one soon.

The review also includes changes for dogs and off-leash areas in certain parks, to reduce the incidents of dogs digging holes on sports grounds and make sure park maintenance staff can work without any interruptions.

The purpose of these changes is to improve the management and control of pets in public spaces, ensuring the safety, enjoyment and harmony of both the community and the environment.



As part of the review, we are seeking community feedback on the proposed introduction of a night-time (7pm to 7am) cat curfew and the broader Council Order.

A new style of community garden sprouts in Yarra

We're committed to helping people in Yarra access ways to grow food and have recently installed two Small Communal Growing Spaces, as part of a new trial.

The trial also aims to provide the community with more opportunities to connect through growing leafy greens and herbs which can be shared by residents within the neighbourhood.

Clifton Reserve in Clifton Hill and Linear Reserve in Fitzroy North are home to these new-style community gardens. The spaces each feature transportable planter boxes and a toolbox which doubles as a bench seat. While a gardening group of residents care for each space, the herbs and leafy greens are for all locals to enjoy. "It's so great to be able to pop over to the garden and grab a few leaves in the evening for a salad rather than buying a full bunch, much of which withers in the fridge," said Gen in Clifton Hill.

Additional goals of the project are to reduce single waste plastic, food miles and household costs at the local level.

We'll assess the outcome of the trial after 12 months and consider expanding the initiative.

Grow food safely

As with many inner-city areas, parts of Yarra were once predominantly industrial. To ensure your veggies and herbs are safe to eat, we recommend soil testing, or grow edibles in containers or raised beds. Head to page 15 to find out how you can apply for a planter box for your street.

Electoral Structure Review brings change to Council elections

Following a change to legislation, the way Councillors in the City of Yarra are elected will be changing. One big change is that from the 2024 election, the municipality will be divided into more wards, with only one Councillor elected in each one.

An independent panel – called the **Electoral Representation Advisory Panel** – is conducting a review of the system and is asking for feedback from the community. The panel will be making recommendations about:

- the number of Councillors Yarra should have
- where the ward boundaries should be
- what the new wards should be named.

Plus, electric appliances have been proven to be safer and healthier, eliminating indoor pollution associated with gas.
