4.1 Local Law 8 - Arrangements for Australia Day 2015

Trim Record Number: D15/2149

Responsible Officer: Director Community Programs

Purpose

1. This report seeks Council consideration and endorsement of amended Local Law 8 – Consumption of Liquor in Public Places (LL8) provisions for the Australia Day long weekend in 2015.

Background

2. The regulation of consumption of alcohol in prescribed public places within the Yarra municipality is governed by LL8; this local law provides Council with the power to prescribe areas and times to allow the responsible consumption of alcohol.
3. Generally LL8 allows the consumption of alcohol in prescribed public open spaces (parks and reserves) between the hours of 9.00 am and 9.00 pm. The local law allows both prescribed areas and times to be varied by Council resolution.
4. A special Council meeting is required to make this resolution as there are no active delegations from Council to the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) enabling LL8 provisions to be amended.
5. A Council resolution delegating powers to the CEO to vary LL8 under certain conditions might have been made in December 2014 but it was the officer view that any decision of Council relating to Australia Day 2015 would best be informed by the experience of New Year's Eve 2014. In future a report containing recommended provisions for New Year's Eve, Australia Day, festivals and other public events will be put to Council on an annual basis in July or August.

New Year's Eve 2014/15

6. Council will be aware that LL8 was varied to prohibit consumption of alcohol over the New Year period. This change was an important underpinning to the safe and effective management of all parks and reserves across Yarra on New Year's Eve 2014/15.
7. Council officers monitored the entire municipality and noted that the most significant gatherings (mainly local families) at two locations Quarries Park (Clifton Hill) and Edinburgh Gardens (North Fitzroy) at both 9.30 pm and midnight to view the fireworks and welcome in the new-year.
8. Council's coordinated management of this event resulted in an incident free New Year's Eve across the municipality. In comparison to the previous year, there were no arrests in public open spaces, no reported assaults or damage to public or private property. Council registered one noise complaint; residents and visitors were able to have peaceful enjoyment of their neighbourhoods. This result has been commended by the Victoria Police and some residents.
9. It is the very positive experience of NYE2014 that has partly informed the recommendation of officers to vary the LL8 provisions for the Australia Day weekend. The 'events' are not directly comparable in terms of attendance, dynamics and timing but the effectiveness of controlling public alcohol consumption to reduce or eliminate sources of risk is a valuable and transferrable lesson.

Australia Day 2015

10. Australia Day 2015 is Monday 26 January 2015. It is anticipated that the long weekend created by Australia Day may present a challenge for Council to effectively manage public safety in its open space reserves and it is on a precautionary basis that a recommendation is being made to vary LL8 for Sunday 25 January 2015 and Monday 26 January 2015.

11. Initial operational planning for Australia Day 2015 has been conducted on the basis of LL8 provisions not being amended. The change in recommendation has arisen primarily from advice received from Victoria Police and Council's independent safety and risk consultant who have both expressed a strong preference that the public consumption of alcohol not be allowed over the long weekend. After further discussion both have accepted as an alternative that the prescribed hours allowing alcohol consumption be curtailed.
12. In the opinion of Council's independent risk management consultant and the Victoria Police the critical issue which led to poor behaviour on Australia Day in 2014 was allowing alcohol consumption for 12 hour period from 9.00 am to 9.00 pm. At this time (in almost complete darkness) it became very difficult for Victoria Police and security to effectively manage a relatively small crowd that had been drinking all day.
13. An extract from a Council Report on management arrangements for Australia Day 2014 presented to Council in April 2014 is attached for information.
14. On Sunday 26 January 2014 there was a peak crowd estimated at between 4,500 and 5,000 at Edinburgh Gardens in the mid afternoon. It is noted that there was relatively controlled behaviour during the most of the day but in the late evening there was significant aggression and disorderly behaviour by intoxicated people resulting in 4 arrests.
15. Victoria Police deployed 70 officers to the municipality (with a focus on Edinburgh Gardens) for Australia Day 2014 and Council has been informed that nothing like these numbers of officers will be available for 2015. Victoria Police have previously advised that if additional police numbers are required to control an avoidable situation then a 'fee for service' arrangement might apply.
16. Enhanced monitoring and security arrangements will be in place across the municipality for the entire long weekend but it is anticipated that the main focus will be at Edinburgh Gardens on Sunday 25 January 2015 and Monday 26 January 2015. Arrangements will not be significantly amended if the recommended LL8 provisions are not approved by Council but there will be a requirement to increase security presence and enhance coordination arrangements around times of elevated risk.
17. Recent research by Turning Point and Vic Health has outlined a concerning trend of alcohol misuse and January 26 as the worst day of the year for assaults and drunkenness for people aged under 25. Key findings from the report include:
 - (a) a study of ambulance attendances and, hospital emergency presentations and admissions and police data on assaults and traffic incidents in Melbourne from 2000 to 2009 reveals a surge of incidents on public holidays which involve hot weather;
 - (b) the research shows that after New Year's Eve, assaults and acute intoxication among the general Melbourne population peaks on Australia Day, followed by Anzac Day;
 - (c) on Australia Day, ambulance attendances for intoxicated young people more than doubled. There was more than 50% of young people treated for intoxication in emergency departments, while there was a two-fold increase in people treated for injuries due to assaults;
 - (d) there is a spike in emergency department presentations related to alcohol the day before Australia Day due to people pre-empting the public holiday as a day to recover; and
 - (e) the lead author of the Drinking Cultures and Social Occasions Report, Dr Belinda Lloyd of Turning Point found that public holidays that involved BBQ's and warm weather tended to result in over indulgence and injury.
18. The officer recommendation is a compromise position that will allow responsible consumption of alcohol for lunchtime BBQ's and picnics but hopefully prevent the extended and irresponsible all-day drinking sessions that have resulted in public behaviour, amenity and disorder issues.
19. It will be recommended that Local Law 8 provisions be amended for Sunday 25 January 2015 and Monday 26 January 2015 to:

- (a) prescribe the hours allowing alcohol consumption to be 11am to 5pm on these days; and
 - (b) invoke the 'festival and public event' provisions for all prescribed areas to give Authorised Officers additional powers to direct people to leave the open space reserve if they do not comply with a direction under this local law.
20. It is noted that the prescribed areas will need to be updated with new parks and reserves which have been created in the last 12 months. An updated listing is attached to this report.
21. Normal LL8 provisions will apply on Saturday 24 January 2015. Other local law provisions related to prohibiting 'amplified music' without a permit will be applied as usual.
22. Open space reserves will be advertised as 'glass free' for the long weekend.

Consultation

23. Consultation has occurred with Victoria Police (Inspector Bernie Edwards), Council's Event Risk Management Consultant, Council's contracted security provider and the internal officer project management team.

Financial Implications

24. Council has allocated \$250,000 towards the effective management of safety, public behaviour and amenity issues on New Year's Eve and Australia Day (Sunday and Monday) for the entire municipality. The estimated cost of arrangements made for NYE2014 across the entire municipality is \$140,000. It is anticipated that the cost of the management of the municipality for New Year's Eve and Australia Day will be within the budget allocation.
25. There may be some additional direct costs if Council does not apply the amended provisions but these are not considered material. It should be noted that 'fee for service' costs by Victoria Police are not accounted for in any budget estimates.

Economic Implications

26. There are no significant economic implications arising from this report. One or two businesses have reported a decline in package liquor sales around NYE but isolated financial impacts are not considered relevant in this context.

Environmental Sustainability Implications

27. There are no significant environmental sustainability implications arising from this report. It can be noted that the Edinburgh Gardens suffered almost no material damage arising from the events of NYE2014.

Social Implications

28. The recommendations made in this report will enable Council to more effectively manage public behaviour and amenity issues across the Australia Day weekend. It is disappointing that the behaviour of a few people make it necessary to curtail the consumption of alcohol but the recommendation is seen as a fair compromise for the Saturday and Sunday.

Human Rights Implications

29. There are no human rights implications which are impacted by this report.

Communications with CALD Communities Implications

30. There are no significant CALD Communications implications arising from this report.

Council Plan, Strategy and Policy Implications

31. There is no Council Plan or significant policy implications arising from this report.

Legal Implications

32. Council has been advised by the Victoria Police and by industry safety management professionals regarding the risks associated with this matter.
33. Council has a legislated obligation to endeavour to remove or mitigate all risks it is aware of associated with public behaviour on land under its control. This obligation extends under various pieces of legislation to the general community, all park users, young people, families, local residents, employees, contractors, senior officers and emergency service responders.
34. Under the Occupational Health & Safety Act and other relevant legislation:
 - (a) the CEO and Senior Management have a single primary duty in relation to the management and control of workplaces. (A workplace under the OHS Act is where we have staff and others on duty).

To ensure, so far as is reasonably practicable, that:

Anything arising from the workplace is without risks to the health and safety of workers engaged or caused to be engaged by the person. (So contractors, security staff etc.)
35. The OHS Act applies the above to the CEO, Senior Management and Officers (as defined by the S.6 of the Corporations Act) which includes elected officials.

Options

36. Council has the following options:
 - (a) it may resolve to leave LL8 provisions as normal and allow public consumption of alcohol between the hours and 9.00am and 9.00pm on each of the days;
 - (b) it may resolve to vary the hours allowing public consumption of alcohol in prescribed areas as recommended or another variation; or
 - (c) it may resolve to prohibit the public consumption of alcohol for a defined period.
37. Under any option Council officers will work to effectively manage risk on behalf of Council over the Australia Day weekend.

Conclusion

38. The officer recommendation to vary the hours allowing public consumption of alcohol in prescribed areas is seen as a reasonable compromise that will allow members of the Yarra community to celebrate and consume alcohol responsibly during the lunch and afternoon period and provide police and Local Laws Officers adequate time to manage expectations and behaviour before sunset.
39. The critical amenity and public behaviour issues during Australia Day 2014 arose late in the day where some individuals and groups drank to excess over an extended period of time and the onset of darkness made monitoring and controlling poor behaviour more difficult for police and authorised officers.

RECOMMENDATION

1. That Council:
 - (a) resolve under Part Four of Local Law 8 – Consumption of Liquor in Public Places to prescribe the hours allowing alcohol consumption in public places to be 11am to 5pm on both Sunday 25 January and Monday 26 January 2015;
 - (b) resolve to include the updated list of parks and reserves at Attachment A as ‘prescribed areas’ under Part Four of Local Law 8 – Consumption of Liquor in Public Places;
 - (c) invoke the ‘festival and public event’ provisions under Part Three of Local Law 8 – Consumption of Liquor in Public Places for all prescribed areas on both Sunday 25 January and Monday 26 January 2015 to provide Authorised Officers (being Victoria Police) the power to direct people leave the open space reserve if they do not comply with a direction under this local law;

- (d) note that local law provisions related to prohibiting 'amplified music' without a permit will be applied as usual for the Australia Day long weekend;
- (e) note that all open space reserves within the municipality will be advertised as 'glass free' for the Australia Day long weekend; and
- (f) note that a public notice to this effect will be placed in a newspaper generally circulating in the municipality and an extensive communications program will be initiated to provide advice to members of the community of Council's decision.

Attachment 1 - Extract from Australia Day Review Report – April 2014

(D15/4661)

Review of Council's response across the 2013 Australia Day weekend

1. Council's management of the community gatherings at Edinburgh Gardens across the Australia Day weekend was in accordance with the Council resolution on 6 January 2014.
2. It is estimated that the costs to plan and respond to the weekend were in excess of \$120,000.
3. An estimated 3,000 to 5,000 people attended the gardens across the weekend.
4. There were no reported major crowd, amenity or safety incidents.
5. Victoria Police were well represented across the weekend and have advised the estimated costs to have a police presence at this event was around \$30,000. Police have specifically indicated that in the future, if there was a planned role for police at an event that involved alcohol, Council may be required to pay a fee or cover police staffing costs.
6. The combined proactive presence of local laws officers, police and Council contracted security guards over the 2014 Australia Day week-end, was aimed at ensuring alcohol remained in the designated areas until 9pm, and that after this time there was no alcohol in the gardens. This combined presence also acted as a deterrent to people setting up for amplified dance parties.
7. It was observed that very few people used the 'dry' area of the park over the weekend.
8. Police acknowledged the pro-active work of Local Laws Officers and Council contracted security guards advising people throughout the day about the changed park conditions for the weekend and speaking to people who brought generators and sound systems.
9. Police have subsequently reiterated their request that future New Year's Eve and Australia Day celebrations at Edinburgh Gardens be alcohol free events which would be consistent with events in the City of Melbourne and across the state on New Year's Eve.
10. Police, Council's risk management consultant and the contracted security firm all advised that separating the site into a wet and dry area was both difficult to manage and confusing for patrons.
11. A first aid marquee was erected next to the Maternal and Child Healthcare Centre. Sixteen incidents were reported, with the majority being self-treated. One incident reported to first aid personnel was a man who'd fallen off his bike and cut himself.
12. Hired lighting, supported by existing park lighting, was used sensibly and not turned on until it was completely dark. It was then switched on incrementally from the southern end, in a manner consistent with house lights being turned on in a venue, as cue for people that it might be a time to pack up and cease alcohol consumption.
13. From about 8.30pm security and Police began reminding people about Local Law 8. By 9.15pm all of the lights in the park had been turned on and by 9.30pm, the majority of people had left.
14. For the number of people in the park that evening, the number of toilets onsite was sufficient. Community feedback has provided some suggestions for improving the location of these cubicles in the future.
15. The rotunda was fenced off for the weekend as in the past it had been a key site for groups to set up amplified music.

Attachment 1 - Extract from Australia Day Review Report – April 2014

16. Some anti-social behaviour observed in the gardens was concentrated around the Skate Park and International House. In the future this area will need to be monitored more closely.
17. During the course of the weekend Council operated an Event Management Centre which provided a central point of contact for all officials. Having allocated Area Wardens also worked well by providing a front-line customer service approach when interacting with the public.
18. Communication in the lead up to, and across the weekend, involved news on Council's website and social media posts. Social media was specifically monitored for events/activities planned in key municipal parks including Darling Gardens, Dights Falls and Edinburgh Gardens.
19. In response Local Laws Officers, at various times over the weekend attended to pop-up events and amplified sound that had been identified in the other local parks.
20. Site cleaning was undertaken by CleanEvent, who were pro-active and thorough in their approach. Toilet cleaning and restocking of consumables, both of existing amenities and hired toilets was provided by UMS.
21. The costs for managing the celebrations at Edinburgh Gardens over the Australia Day weekend were in excess of \$120,000.
22. Costs related to provision of extra lighting, portable toilets, additional rubbish bins and skips, cleaning, signage, contract security services, first aid, additional water fountains, set up of a central control centre, and personnel over the long weekend to deliver risk management, parking, local laws and waste management services.
23. In addition to this there were indirect costs associated with having a dedicated project officer to manage the event as well as other senior officer time to support this.
24. Feedback from the community about Council's response to the weekend was very positive. This came in the form of verbal comments to Councillors and Officers, letters and emails to Councillors and social media posts.
