DELEGATES REPORT

In December 2022, signatories to the United Nation Convention on Biological Diversity met in Montreal to agree on a new 10 plan to protect biodiversity and restore ecosystems in the context of a biodiversity crisis with accelerating rates of extinction.

Parties to this Convention were to meet in Kunming, China mid-2022, however the escalation of COVID there meant a rapid change of venue to Montreal, with co-host China. The Biodiversity COP15, which took place in Montréal, Canada, from 7 to 19 December 2022, was a historic moment, following four years of intensive consultations and delays in the negotiation process due to the COVID pandemic.

I attended this conference in my role as global advisor on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Restoration to ICLEI: Local Governments for Sustainability, but also representing Yarra in a presentation as part of the **Summit for Subnational Governments** and Cities, held as an official parallel event to COP 15.

Background

The stakes for this COP were high.


The Intergovernmental Science-Policy Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services (IPBES) 7th Global Assessment Report on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services, released in 2019, warned about unprecedented extinction rates and described increasing threats to biodiversity and ecosystem functioning, from climate change, increasing urbanization, unchecked unsustainable production and consumption patterns, unsustainable agricultural practices to deforestation, which exacerbate biodiversity loss and ecosystem degradation.

The World Economic Forum (WEF) <u>2022 Global Risks Report</u>, identified biodiversity loss as the 3rd highest most severe risk on the global scale over the next 10 years (up from 5th place in the <u>2021 Global Risks Report</u>).

The global scorecard on achieving the Aichi Biodiversity Targets (ABTs), adopted at COP10 in Nagoya in 2010, was dismal: the 5th Global Biodiversity Outlook (GBO-5), released in September 2020, demonstrated that none of the ABT's had been met, and the world was not on track for the 2050 Biodiversity Vision of 'living in harmony with nature'.

The COVID-19 pandemic brought the consequences of nature's decline into stark reality, and reminded us of the interconnectedness between nature and people. Urban communities, and particularly the vulnerable and marginalized communities within cities, were most impacted by the consequences of the disconnect between nature and people.

In his <u>2020 "The State of the Planet" address</u> delivered at Columbia University, Antonio Guterres, United Nations (UN) Secretary General warned that "Humanity is waging war on nature. This is suicidal. Nature always strikes back – and it is already doing so with growing force and fury. Biodiversity is collapsing. One million species are at risk of extinction. Ecosystems are disappearing before our eyes ... Human activities are at the root of our descent toward chaos. But that means human action can help to solve it." He added that 'making peace with nature' should be the defining task of the 21st Century.



Role of subnational and local governments at COP15

The 7th Summit for Subnational Governments and Cities, held as an official parallel event to COP15 on 11 and 12 December in the main negotiation room, and the first ever associated Pavilion from 7 to 17 December, represented a historic game changer. There were more than 200 subnational and local government leaders representing 300+ cities and regions from 70+ countries around the world.

The parties adopted *Kunming-Montréal Global Biodiversity Framework*, a new 10 year agreement on the protection of biodiversity and ecosystems which includes

- A stronger and more ambition decision and Plan of Action on engaging subnational and local governments in its implementation
- Recognising the role of subnational and local governments within the Framework including for the first time a target specifically directed at local governments
- References to subnational and local governments in several other COP 15 decisions.

This is the only UN Framework to identify a specific role for local governments in its implementation.

The key Decision regarding subnational and local governments is that on Engagement with subnational governments, cities and other local authorities to enhance implementation of the post-2020 global biodiversity framework and its Plan of Action for 2022-2030.

As part of this, the Agreement provides "a comprehensive Plan of Action with the following clear objectives, to support Parties, and their subnational and local governments and their partners in implementing the GBF:

 To increase the engagement of subnational and local governments in supporting the successful implementation of, and reporting on, national biodiversity strategies and action plans (NBSAPs), the GBF and the programs of work under the Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD);"

It is expected that local governments will contribute to the reporting on their national agreement. The agreed reporting platform will be the ICLEI Cities with Nature and Regions with Nature platforms.

Yarra Council joined Cities with Nature 4 years ago and has been joined by many more globally since.

Several of the Framework's 23 action-oriented global targets are relevant to both subnational and local governments

With direct reference to urban and densely populated areas, Target 12 urges

increasing the area, quality and connectivity, and improving access to and benefits from green and blue spaces in urban areas.

Target 12 featured in a panel discussion on <u>Health and well-being in cities: acting</u> <u>for access to green and blue spaces</u>, where I presented Yarra as a case study in actively planning for new green spaces in a highly urbanised environment.

The dynamic exchange across the conference and during the summit on actions being taken by local governments everywhere to prevent extinction, enhance biodiversity and restore ecosystems was both inspiring and informative.

Yarra's Nature Strategy is seen as a good model for an inner urban municipality and delegates were keen to know more.

The adoption of the new 10 year agreement in the *Kunming-Montréal Global Biodiversity Framework* represents a last chance for many species, including many in Australia, as well as an opportunity to stop the war on nature that has been waged now for some centuries.

The recognition that biodiversity and nature are key to our own future and that urgent action is needed, is increasing in the Yarra community who want to see Yarra take strong action on this as well as on climate change.

It is always an honour to represent Yarra at such events and to know that our practices and ambitions are strong and provide leadership where it's needed.

- 2. That an update report on the implementation of Yarra's Nature Strategy be provided to the May council meeting and that thereafter updates be provided via the Annual Plan reporting.

BACKGROUND

The Biodiversity COP15, which took place in Montréal, Canada, from 7 to 19 December 2022, was a historic moment, following four years of intensive consultations and delays in the negotiation process due to the COVID pandemic.

I attended this conference in my role as global advisor on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Restoration to <u>ICLEI: Local Governments for Sustainability</u>, but also representing Yarra in a presentation as part of the **Summit for Subnational Governments and Cities**, held as an official parallel event to COP 15.

The Intergovernmental Science-Policy Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services (IPBES) 7th Global Assessment Report on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services, released in 2019, warned about unprecedented extinction rates and described increasing threats to biodiversity and ecosystem functioning, from climate change, increasing urbanization, unchecked unsustainable production and consumption patterns, unsustainable agricultural practices to deforestation, which exacerbate biodiversity loss and ecosystem degradation.

The World Economic Forum (WEF) <u>2022 Global Risks Report</u>, identified biodiversity loss as the 3rd highest most severe risk on the global scale over the next 10 years (up from 5th place in the 2021 Global Risks Report).

The global scorecard on achieving the Aichi Biodiversity Targets (ABTs),

adopted at COP10 in Nagoya in 2010, was dismal: the <u>5th Global Biodiversity</u> <u>Outlook</u> (GBO-5), released in September 2020, demonstrated that none of the ABT's had been met, and the world was not on track for the 2050 Biodiversity Vision of 'living in harmony with nature'.

The COVID-19 pandemic brought the consequences of nature's decline into stark reality, and reminded us of the interconnectedness between nature and people. Urban communities, and particularly the vulnerable and marginalized communities within cities, were most impacted by the consequences of the disconnect between nature and people.

In his 2020 "The State of the Planet" address delivered at Columbia University, Antonio Guterres, United Nations (UN) Secretary General warned that "Humanity is waging war on nature. This is suicidal. Nature always strikes back – and it is already doing so with growing force and fury. Biodiversity is collapsing. One million species are at risk of extinction. Ecosystems are disappearing before our eyes ... Human activities are at the root of our descent toward chaos. But that means human action can help to solve it." He added that 'making peace with nature' should be the defining task of the 21st Century.

12.3 Councillor Stone - Street Gardening Guidelines

COUNCIL RESOLUTION

- 1. That:
 - (a) officers bring forward a report to the May cycle of council on the process for developing Street Garden Guidelines for Community members who wish to contribute to gardening with non-edible plants in public places.

CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY

BACKGROUND

There is a growing interest in the community in helping to maintain and plant out public spaces such as tree surrounds, nature strips and street gardens. Like the urban agriculture movement of a decade ago, guerrilla gardens have sprung up across Yarra, generally with passion and commitment by residents to contribute to streetscape attractiveness and enhance urban green spaces.

Yarra Council commits significant resources each year to maintaining our streetscapes, ensuring they are safe, that appropriate plants are used, that they are biodiverse, provide habitat, shade and protection. And that they will survive the rigours of a harsh city environment and a changing climate.

There are benefits to residents helping to maintain streetscapes and many councils have developed guidelines for community members who wish to garden in these public areas.

Just as the Urban Agriculture Guidelines were developed to guide the practice of growing food in public places, it would be useful to develop **Street Garden Guidelines** to guide those gardeners who wish to improve and help maintain plantings in our streetscapes. These guidelines would help educate the community about the specific requirements of plants in streetscapes, protect plants and members of the public, encourage and provide opportunities for community members to contribute to beautifying our streetscapes, enhance urban spaces and the liveability of local areas.

12.4 Councillor O'Brien - Light pollution impacts on wildlife and people

COUNCIL RESOLUTION

Moved: Councillor O'Brien Seconded: Councillor Glynatsis

1. That:

(a) officers bring forward a report on Council's compliance with the Australian Standard 4282: Control of the Obtrusive effects of Outdoor Lighting, guidelines for the community to limit the effects of light pollution, particularly in wildlife sensitive areas, near green corridors, open spaces, and parks including any gaps in existing policy.

CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY

BACKGROUND

Light pollution is increasing globally and encroaching on biodiversity hot spots. At the same time, the spectral composition of outdoor lighting is rapidly changing, with broad-spectrum light-emitting diodes (LEDs) increasingly being favoured because of their higher energy efficiency. Many studies suggest that narrower-spectrum lighting (e.g., sodium lamps, which emit mostly yellow light) may be less harmful to biological processes.

The increasing threat that light pollution poses to humans, native animals and insects has been well documented, including circadian disruption to people's sleep cycles. A study published in Nature's Scientific Reports found that, sleep loss impairs cognitive performance and alters the song output in Australian magpies. The study suggests after a poor night's sleep, the common black and white Magpie songbird shifts their normal singing from twilight to midday, have a reduced song bandwidth and struggle with cognitive tasks.

Further, much has been written by voluntary organisations and community groups on the impact that light pollution has on the planet, for example The Astronomy Society of Victoria and the International Dark Sky Association Victoria.

Some interventions to limit light pollution include:

- Installation of timer or sensor lights to ensure lights are only activated when needed.
- Ensure lights are turned off when not required for safety or security reasons or when enhancing a night-time scene.
- When buying external lights consider using warm white, lower lumen, lightemitting diode (LED) light globes that are less likely to impact neighbouring properties.
- Wherever possible, direct light downwards, not upwards, to illuminate the target area. If there is no alternative to up-lighting, using shields will help keep spill light to a minimum.
- Locate lights as far as possible from neighbours and away from sensitive areas such as: bedroom windows and living areas, wildlife corridors, open space and parks.
- Ensure that the main beam angle of all lights directed towards any sensitive place is kept below 70 degrees. Use light shields to help minimise glare and the impact on neighbouring properties.
- · Avoid placing the light near a light reflective surface.

- Use specifically designed lighting equipment that, once installed, minimises the spread of light near to, or above the horizontal.
- Don't over-light. Less is more for your neighbours and your electricity bill. (Source City of Whitehorse Victoria).

12.5 Councillor Wade - Continuation of Pride

- 1. That Council:
 - (a) notes the success of the Victoria's Pride event held in the City of Yarra on 12 February 2023, being the second such event to be held on Smith and Gertrude Streets at the conclusion of the Midsumma festival (previously called Melbourne Pride);
 - (b) expresses its support to the state government and Midsumma, and all performers and traders who contributed to an important day on the LGBTIQA+ calendar for 2023:
 - (c) note the Council's appreciation of the confirmation on 12 February 2023 that the event would be run in Yarra again in 2024, and previous announcements confirming four years of funding (including for 2023);
 - (d) reconfirms the Council's support for the continuation of Victoria's Pride as an ongoing, annual event held in the City of Yarra each year; and
 - (e) directs the Mayor to write to the Minister for Equality with respect to the above, and for the Mayor and officers to further engage with the Victorian Government and relevant stakeholders to secure a commitment for this to occur.

CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY

BACKGROUND

Melbourne Pride was a landmark event initiated by the Victorian Government to commemorate the 40th anniversary of the decriminalisation of homosexuality in Victoria, with the first event taking place in the City of Yarra on 13 February 2022. It was a spectacular one-day festival that transformed our iconic Gertrude and Smith Streets with live music and arts performances to celebrate Victoria's LGBTIQA+ community and culture, which saw 38,000 people celebrating on the streets of Yarra.

A second, even bigger, event took place on 12 February 2023, renamed as "Victoria's Pride".

The event received an overwhelmingly positive response from local residents, businesses and visitors, and in particular the LGBTIQA+ community. There is a high level of interest in this initiative continuing on a permanent, annual basis.

This motion seeks to recognise the importance of this event and for Council to formally support its continuation as an ongoing, annual event held in the City of Yarra.
